National History Day

National History Day has grown from a local contest in Cleveland, Ohio in 1975 into a competition that involves over 700,000 students nationwide. NHD promotes the study of history through workshops, seminars, internships, and competitions. Laurie Devine is Arizona's NHD coordinator, and she is working with Susan E. to promote National History Day in Pima County. The national competition is open to 6th - 12th graders, but Arizona has developed a separate poster category for 4th and 5th graders to compete in the state contest. Students create entries around that year's theme--the 2005 National History Day theme is *Communication in History: Key to Understanding*.

Laurie Devine, an Arizona state archivist, has developed an [Arizona state supplement](#) to help students understand NHD. It includes information on how to select a topic, where to find resource materials, and how to prepare for competition. .

NHD competition categories include documentaries, exhibits, historical papers, performances, and web sites (web sites are eligible only for the Arizona competition - this category will be open nationally in 2006).

Students in Pima County are fortunate to have mentors prepared to work with them to develop their NHD entries. These mentors will provide guidance and support to NHD participants, and will work with the students to ensure that they are well prepared for competition.

There are also funding opportunities available to students who are concerned about the expense involved in creating an NHD entry. Additional expenses that a student or group of students cannot meet may be funded--examples are money to build sets or create costumes, or incidental travel expenses. If you are interested in receiving funding and have a sensible and well-thought-out plan for a project, please contact Susan E. for more information.

Competition is open to both individual students and to groups of up to three students.

Special awards are given in the Arizona competition in addition to the competition awards.

Fourth- and fifth-grade students competing in the special state poster category must prepare posters relating to the competitions annual theme and Arizona history (4th grade), or to the annual theme and U.S. history (encouraged but not required for 5th grade).

Understanding Arizona Homeschooling Requirements

Many homeschoolers aren't that interested in the legal aspects of homeschooling. Their primary concern is their children, and as long as there are no problems related to homeschooling, everything's fine. But there is one reason to be well-informed about the laws that govern homeschooling in Arizona--unless you are very familiar with the regulations, you will not be able recognize when someone else is mistaken in their interpretation of those requirements.

Misconceptions about what is required of homeschoolers is rampant, even among homeschoolers themselves. These range from thinking that testing of homeschooled students is required (it is not), to thinking that there are qualifications that must be met by parents in order to homeschool their child (there are none), to thinking that some sort of approval is required to homeschool. These misconceptions shape the public understanding of homeschooling, and affect homeschoolers when they interact with others, whether family members, health care providers, school officials, or government bureaucracies. Changing misconceptions rests on homeschoolers having a firm understanding of state homeschooling regulations.

In Arizona, homeschooling is one of the legal educational options parent's may choose. The others are public or private school enrollment. Homeschoolers are required to notify their county school superin-

dent of their intent to homeschool, and that is the last contact that a homeschooling family needs to have with officialdom. There are no reports to file; no tests to take; no portfolios to review. And there is no one to answer to. The homeschooling parent has assumed the responsibility for the education of that child, and there is no official oversight to make sure that it is being done a certain way, on a certain schedule.

The state does require that parents provide instruction in reading, grammar, mathematics, social studies and science, but there are no directives on how those subjects should be taught, when they should be taught, or how much time needs to be spent on those subjects. All of this is up to the parent. Arizona law is very good at recognizing that parents generally act in the best interests of their children, and that they should be trusted to make the best educational decisions for their children.

The concept of parental responsibility can be difficult for non-homeschoolers to grasp. Many institutions in the United States encourage the idea that people need guidance, public schools being one example. People who question the ability of parents to homeschool their children are often operating from this premise: that guidance is necessary, and that decisions should be left to experts. What is overlooked is that parents are experts in relation to their own children. They are the "first responders," the people who know their children thoroughly, who are in a position to

recognize their children's needs, and who can be trusted to provide for those needs.

Arizona recognizes the responsibility that homeschooling parents have accepted. No further requirements are placed on homeschooling parents. No one needs to review the child's progress, no one needs to check records that are kept (there are no record keeping requirements for Arizona homeschoolers), no one needs to verify that a parent is homeschooling properly (the filed Affidavit of Intent to Home School constitutes all the proof that is required), and no one needs to approve a homeschooling program for it to continue.

When parents are confident in their knowledge of state homeschooling requirements, they are better able to recognize and deal with friends and family members who have inaccurate information, and to properly handle inappropriate requests from public employees. All parents should understand that they are in charge of their children's education. But homeschooling parents also recognize that they make the educational decisions for their children, and only they have the right and responsibility to make those decisions.
